Jeff Barela Named Director of New Mexico Department of Transportation Traffic Safety Division

The New Mexico Department of Transportation (NMDOT) recently announced Jeff Barela as the new Director of the Traffic Safety Division. Mr. Barela is a native of Santa Fe where he attended St. Michael's High School. He pursued a Bachelor's from the University of New Mexico in Organizational Communication and then received a Master's of Business Administration from New Mexico Highlands University. Prior to coming to the NMDOT Traffic Safety Division, he served as the Executive Director for the Northern Area Local Workforce Development Board. In this capacity he administered the federally funded Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act to help train unemployed and underemployed individuals to meet the workforce needs throughout northern New Mexico. He has a broad range of governmental experience spanning nine years, including previously working at the NMDOT Traffic Safety Division, the New Mexico Human Services Income Support Division and the New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions in various capacities.

New Mexico Seat Belt Use Increases in 2019

The New Mexico Department of Transportation and Preusser Research Group completed the annual New Mexico Occupant Seat Belt Observation Study. The study found New Mexico's seat belt use rate is

91.8%—an increase from previous years and higher than the national average.

New Mexico has conducted a seat belt study nnually since 1982. The study uses a sampling design approved by and aligned with requirements from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Road segments from 19 of the State's 33 counties, which account for 85.5% of passenger vehicle crash-related fatalities, were sampled for inclusion in the current study.



Observations were recorded on Primary, Secondary, and Local roads. Quality control measures were utilized to ensure valid and reliable observation results. Observations are made before the Click it or Ticket enhanced enforcement campaign, and taken again after the campaign has ended. The 2019 study summarizes the results of both the daytime and nighttime observations.

Given that the seat belt use rate has been declining over the last three years, this increase is promising. In the findings, Preusser Research Group found an increase in both the daytime and nighttime seat belt use rates. Recommendations include continuing and increasing the use of timely and strong high-visibility programming and enhanced enforcement campaigns, such as Click it or Ticket. A great time was had by all who visited the State Fair in support of law enforcement. The crowd was delighted when Bucklebear made an appearance—helping teach young children and their families about the importance of always buckling their seat belts.

Winter Weather **Driving Tips**

Winter-weather is here and the New Mexico Department of Transportation is ready. The NMDOT is working around the clock to monitor the roads, report road conditions, spread salt and cinder and plow snow if necessary. In coordination with law enforcement, the NMDOT has some advice for drivers when traveling through unfavorable road conditions.

Tips to Know▶

WEAR YOUR SEATBELT

Make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly buckled up.

REDUCE YOUR SPEED

The best crash prevention on snow and ice is to SLOW DOWN and leave plenty of room between you and the vehicle in front of you.

PRACTICE GOOD WINTER DRIVING TECHNIQUES

Keep your gas tank full, turn on your head lights, keep your windshield washer fluid full with antifreeze, keep winter driving chains in your vehicle, have a winter survival kit which includes - flashlight, hand warmers packets, first aid supplies, high energy snacks, bottled water, medications and read your owner's manual for special instructions on driving 4-wheel drive vehicles and vehicles with ABS on snow and ice.

AVOID DRIVING IN A SNOW CLOUD

Large vehicles, such as semi-trailer trucks and snow plows, may produce dense clouds of blowing snow that make it difficult for drivers to see. When drivers encounter snow clouds, they should stay back to avoid the cloud.

PLAN AHEAD AND BE PATIENT

Delays are common during bad weather. Leave a little earlier and pack your patience.

CHECK BEFORE YOU PASS

Know where a snow plow and blade are positioned on the road before trying to pass. On multi-lane highways, the plow can be in your blind spot. Before attempting to pass make sure it is safe.

PAY ATTENTION TO WEATHER FORECASTS –TRUST THEM

Winter storms can become severe quickly, plan ahead and check the weather.

DO NOT USE CRUISE CONTROL

Never use cruise control when the roads are slick. Using your cruise control can reduce your handling of the vehicle if your tires begin to skid or slip.
